The Mental Health & Recovery Services Board continued expanding both funding sources and programs to serve the communities of Allen, Auglaize, and Hardin counties.

SCHOOLS

Our commitment to improve and enhance services in all school districts has been challenging, rewarding work. School partnerships have been strengthened, services have been made uniform across the system, and we have worked with our providers so that we can respond to school crises in a way that serves both the individual and the school system. This work is exciting, and I am looking forward to next year.

OPIOID EPIDEMIC

The Board continued to engage new partners in creative ways to battle the opioid epidemic in our communities. The work with the courts has proven effective. The re-entry work has reduced barriers for those individuals returning to our communities from confinement.

NEW COLLABORATIONS

A collaborative effort has been strategically developed between the Board, Children's Service Agencies, and SAFY to reduce out-of-home placement for children whose parents need detoxification services to eliminate risk in their homes. We have developed Family Outreach Stabilization Workers who are immersed in the Children's Services investigative teams to quickly evaluate need and facilitate placement for parents who are willing to receive treatment. Doing so allows the family to voluntarily place children with a safe family without court removal, and those families will receive compensation from our grant funding this.

MINORITY OUTREACH

This year we are pleased to demonstrate the great outcomes the Minority and Faith-Based Outreach Navigator has generated with his efforts. This position has navigated hundreds of individuals into outpatient treatment for both mental health and addiction services.

MOBILE RESPONSE STABILIZATION SERVICE

MRSS is a new program initiated this year to aid in resolving family crises by providing skills and support in the home environment.

27 families were served by the MRSS team.

CRISIS STABILIZATION UNIT

The Crisis Stabilization Unit completed its first full year of providing medically managed withdrawal for those with opiate addiction.

944 individuals were served for mental health stabilization.

217 individuals were served for medically managed withdrawal.

MOBILE CRISIS SERVICES

A new program was initiated this year to serve youth in crisis, primarily in the schools.

141 youth were served who were in crisis.1539 adults were served who were in crisis.

HOUSING

Housing continues to be a priority for the MHRSB.

133 individuals were served in Supportive Housing.

110 individuals were served in Recovery Housing.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE

The Board is actively involved with the courts, jails, prisons, and law enforcement to connect clients involved with the criminal justice system to services.

277 adults were served by Criminal Justice Coordinators.

201 youth were served by Juvenile Court Liaisons.

SCHOOL-BASED PREVENTION SERVICES

Providing on-site services to the schools to ensure students are being connected to services and are receiving evidence-based prevention services remains a top priority.

1253 students were served in the schools for S-BIRT screening services.

285 students were served in the schools in targeted mental health groups.

1376 students were served in the schools in the drug and alcohol prevention program Refuse Remove Reasons.

2493 students were served in the schools in the suicide prevention Lifelines program.788 students participated in youth-led Gatekeeper groups in 22 schools.

MERCY HEALTH INPATIENT DETOXIFICATION

The Board helped to support St. Rita's Mercy Health with detoxification services for those with alcohol and opiate addiction.

41 adults were financially supported for Medically Managed Withdrawal at St. Rita's Mercy Health.


OVERDOSE QUICK RESPONSE TEAM

A Quick Response Team responded to those immediately after an opiate overdose at all our local hospitals to provide support and linkage to services.


132 adults were seen after opiate overdoses in local area hospitals to connect them to services and 61 engaged in treatment services.






Funding Spent - Allen





Funding Spent - Auglaize





Funding Spent - Hardin


